Student Learning Outcomes

This course introduces students to the concepts of linear algebra. Topics include matrix algebra, Gaussian elimination, determinants, vector spaces and their properties with an introduction to proofs, linear transformations, orthogonality, eigenvalues and eigenvectors, and computational methods.

Math 270:

For a given set of problems, the student will demonstrate quantitative reasoning by developing a problem-solving strategy, performing appropriate analysis and computation, and critically assessing the meaning of the conclusion or outcome.

Required Materials

1. Calculator

Math 270: A graphing calculator is strongly recommended for this course. If you do not already have a graphing calculator, the Mathematics department recommends that you purchase a Texas Instruments TI-83 Plus or TI-84 graphing calculator. On those tests/quizzes where a calculator is permitted, the only allowed models will be the TI 83/84.

2. A notebook (Class Notebook) for note taking and working problems

You should treat this class as you would any other math class. Take notes in a notebook, work practice or homework problems on paper in an organized manner. I will typically check your notebook on the day of each exam. However, your notebook will be submitted to be graded at the completion of the course. Be sure to keep it clean, organized, and up to date.
